

# **Helpful Tips for Volunteers**

1. <u>Contact you teacher right away</u>. Call or Email him/her to introduce yourself as their JA Volunteer, set up your observation visit, and your first classroom visit.

#### 2. Observation Visit

- a. Find out where to park
- b. Figure out the "check-in" procedure
- c. Find your teacher's classroom
- d. Take a moment to get "comfortable" in the classroom
  - i. Where is the whiteboard?
  - ii. Are there magnets/tape you can use to hang posters?
  - iii. Ask the teach if all the students have access to crayons/pencils/markers (if your program involves coloring activities)

#### 3. In the days prior to your first visit

- a. Read the "first session" portion of your volunteer manual
- b. Locate all materials needed for your first session
- c. Consider only bringing with you the materials needed in the first session as to not confuse yourself with an overwhelming amount of material.

### 4. On the day of your first visit

- a. BREATHE
- b. If you mess up or skip a portion of the lesson by mistake, DON'T WORRY! By you being there and taking the time out of your busy schedule YOU ARE ALREADY MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN THIS STUDENTS LIFE.

## c. HAVE FUN!!!!!!!!!!!!!
